Charles Adelbert Clark-Octagon House Owner

Mysteries Uncovered

In a previous issue, as part of a series on previous Octagon House owners I outlined what we knew about Charles A. Clark with some additional pieces of information gleaned from the census and other records. Recently even more information was discovered.

While I was doing research on something else in the book "Erie County and Its People " by Truman C. White, published in 1898 I discovered some additional information I wanted to share.

It turns out Mr. Clark was a Civil War veteran and a popular and distinguished one at that. He served in the 27th N.Y. Battery where he was first commissioned a Second Lieutenant and several months later promoted to First Lieutenant. After serving in the 9th (Burnside's Corps) and the 2nd (Hancock's Corps) he was promoted to Captain of the 12th N.Y. Battery where he served until the close of the war.

A peer of his reflected upon him that he was "a cool, energetic officer and no matter what danger or difficulties may surround him always preserves a firm upper lip, and I can safely say no one ever saw a trace of fear lurking in his face. In his intercourse with the men he was affable and considerate, while on points respecting duty or discipline he was rigid and exacting-two characteristics in an officer that go far toward producing military efficiency and maintaining a healthy tone in the ranks. The 27th is a loser by his advance."

After the war he became a clerk to Buffalo Mayor C.J. Wells. In 1870, for nine years, he was Superintendent of the Akron Cement Works. In 1879 he returned to Buffalo as a clerk in the employ of James H. Jewett, a shoe dealer until 1892. In 1893 he was a passenger and ticket agent for The Crystal Beach Steamboat and Ferry Company.

This is as far as Mr. White's book takes us in 1898 when Mr. Clark still held that position. Mr. Clark is buried in Forest Lawn Cemetery. He died in 1918. He is buried next to his wife who predeceased him in 1910.

The tombstone reads, "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they will see God."

MAPLE LAWN CEMETERY RESTORATION PROJECT

As you may recall, in 2020 the Newstead Historical Society undertook a project at the Maple Lawn Cemetery to repair and resurrect many of the gravestones that had fallen into disrepair through the years. The historical society hired Brian Daddis Masonry, and with the assistance of Town Councilman John Jendrowski thirty-five gravestones were completed. That project was completed at a cost of \$4,000 which was funded by the Newstead Historical Society.

At a recent board meeting the Society approved an additional \$6,000 to address an additional sixteen more severely damaged stones. These that include Revolutionary War, War of 1812 and Civil War Veterans, and other local notables.

In mid-October 2022 the work was begun again. Currently the row closest to John Street is being worked on by Brian, of Brian Daddis Masonry.

He will reconstruct bases for many of these stones, but on the first gravestone he attempted to work on he found the base buried in the dirt. This was for Henry Strait, Civil War veteran. In that first week he also resurrected the stones of Lanson Gifford Tanner who was wounded at the battle of Fair Oaks in the Civil War, as well as A.C. Tanner, another Civil War veteran. Chief Clinton Moses' stone was also raised. He was a Native American who volunteered to serve in the war but was discharged when they found out he was a Native American.

The next set of graves to be worked on include William Love (another Civil War veteran), Peleg Hart, Revolutionary War veteran, and Jonathan Delano, War of 1812 veteran.

One of the more interesting stories is that of Peleg Hart's grave. Peleg Hart's grave was hidden for years under the fence, and no one knew it was there until his family visited and removed grass that had grown over it. They moved the stone more inside the fence with the aid of some Boy Scouts doing a project there, according to family members. His stone needs a new base and other repair as it is missing a piece.

The total final phase is expected to take approximately another month, weather permitting. It represents a total commitment on the part of the Newstead Historical Society of \$10,000, some of which was in donations specifically designated for the project.

RECIPE CORNER

Here's a recipe from *A Book of Favorite Recipes* by the Akron Parent-Teachers Association of Akron Central School dated 1969. This recipe is titled "Anise Xmas Cookies" submitted by Idabelle Bedford.



ANISE XMAS COOKIES

4 c. butter or margarine	10c. pastry flour
6 or 7 eggs, well beaten	8 tsp. baking powder
4 c. granulated sugar	1 tsp. salt
25 drops essence of anise	

Cream butter, add eggs and sugar. Mix well and add anise oil; after blended together add flour, baking powder and salt which have been sifted together.

Let stand until cool and roll on well-floured board to between 1/8 to 1/4 inch thickness [and cut with] with Xmas cookie cutters. Bake in 350-degree oven for 10 to 12 minutes, or until golden brown. Frost as desired.

Disclaimer: I have not tested the recipes submitted for the Recipe Corner. They are given exactly as they appear in the cookbook in which they were originally published.
