

RECIPE CORNER

Jannette Potera

Here's a recipe from *The Akron Cookbook* published by the Ladies Aid Society of First Methodist Episcopal Church, Akron, NY dated 1921. This recipe is titled "Cracker Jack" submitted by Mrs. C. H. Twinn.

CRACKER JACK

Pop the corn and after removing the hard and unpoped kernels pour into a deep bowl; add some nut kernels, boil until the syrup cracks in cold water, 1 cup molasses, 2 cups sugar, 1 tablespoon butter, 2 tablespoons vinegar; take from fire, add ½ teaspoon soda, beat briskly and pour over popcorn and chopped peanuts; this is enough syrup for three quarts of popped corn.

MRS. C. H. TWINN

For Newstead's Bicentennial, here's a recipe from *American Domestic Cookery* attributed to Maria Rundell and published in 1823. The recipe is titled "Little white Cakes" and sounds like a nice cookie recipe.

Little white Cakes.

Dry half a pound of flour, rub into it a very little pounded sugar, one ounce of butter, one egg, a few caraways, and as much milk and water as to make a paste; roll it thin, and cut it with the top of a cannister or glass. Bake fifteen minutes on tin plates.

Disclaimer: I have not tested the recipes submitted for the Recipe Corner. They are given exactly as they appear in the cookbook in which they were originally published.
