Foundation Update

The limestone foundation, original to the Octagon House, has been repaired, revamped, and restored with many thanks to Brian Daddis of Brian Daddis Heritage Masonry. Brian is no stranger to the NHS as he has also restored some of the gravestones in our local cemeteries. Mr. Daddis removed the parging (plaster) in areas where it had become detached from the stonework while keeping what was solid in place and took great care in mixing the new mortar so that the finished color and amount of aggregate matched the original as closely as possible. The wall next to the receiving room required the most work, and the results are terrific.

In time for the holidays the Newstead Historical Society has two new fund-raisers that will also make great gifts First are Luminaria Kits to be displayed December 14th, to coincide with Light up Akron 2024.

Each kit will include supplies to make 10 luminaries at the cost of \$30.00 per kit. Second is a beautiful ornament of the Octagon House made from metal featuring amazing details. Cost is \$25

Union Apartments- Century Landmark #14

At the Newstead Historical Society's October meeting Mr. Al Thomas was given a Century Landmark plague for his building, The Union Apartments at 20-22 Mechanic St. This is the 14th building in the Akron/Newstead area to receive a Century Landmark. The apartments, formerly known as The Union Hotel, Silver Sabre, B.J.'s and The Beginning are listed by the town as being built in 1880. The property is first listed as the private residence of J. Clement. The Clements passed it on to their heirs, the Bittermans, who owned it from 1895-1943 through three successive generations and operated it as a hotel. The 1909 map is when it is first listed as The Union Hotel.



The lower end of Main Street was a hotel district in those days, with the American Hotel located on the corner of Main and Buffalo Street, The Altenberg Hotel where the current fire house is, the Akron House where Yogi's is now and the Eckerson House further up on Main Street. The assumption is that some of these places had live entertainment.



The next owners were Mr. Bitterman's son, E.W., and his wife Mary who named it The Hotel Union, a slight variation. In 1920 they passed it on to their son, Earl, who was later joined by Albert Quane as a partner in 1927. They ran it until 1947 when it was taken over by the DeLuzio family. Bernard Rosenecker owned it for a short time and called it B.J.'s and it is believed that is when it made its first appearance as a bar. Tom Cowan purchased it in 1971 as a bar-restaurant, and a part-time hotel for shortterm renters. He removed some walls to open it up, introduced live music every Friday night and added chicken wings to the menu. He named it The Silver Sabre, after the Buffalo Sabres.

In 1974 it was sold to Al O'Brien who called it The Beginning. The landmark tavern suffered a serious fire in August of that year when a basement fire burned one inside wall completely through the first and second floors. A charred basement wall still exists. The fire was put out in an hour luckily because a passerby reported it and due to its proximity to the fire

department. Mr. O'Brien, asleep upstairs, escaped by a fireman's ladder. Around 1978 it was switched to apartments though there was still room for a tavern with a capacity of 40 people. Thereafter followed a succession of owners until Al Thomas purchased it in 2001. It is now six apartments and has a commanding view of Main Street.

Although officially closed in September, we still welcomed fourth grade Akron Central School students on October 15th and 17th. There were 78 students over two days, broken into four groups of ten each day. At KSM we further divided them into groups of five because part of the tour was of the rotating exhibit, "Fashions from the Collection", housed in a very small side room of the museum and I could not fit them in otherwise. So, the team and I did the presentation eight times each day, which had not occurred to me when I suggested it! I got some rolled eyes on that! Amelia Bloomer would be proud to see how far we have come! Pat Pearce explained how there used to be milk delivery, while showing an old milk box. They couldn't get over that either. In the spring we have invited them to do a walking tour with us of upper Main Street. These tours will be coordinated by Kate Parzych of the Rich-Twinn Octagon House. The students also toured RTOH the same days. Thank you, Kate!

Just a side note, as we closed the season for the year our attendance figures were up over last year, even excluding the student tour figures. This was interesting considering last year was a Bi-Centennial year with high attendance figures.

For the Christmas season we will be open for" Light Up Akron" with an expanded version of our fashion exhibit so if you have seen it before or have not seen it all please stop in. It has been added to and updated. The date is December 14th from 4-8 p.m. and there is a trolley that will shuttle you back and forth between the Rich-Twinn Octagon House and the Knight Sutton Museum. The RTOH is open from 6-8 p.m. that day and the trolley begins from there, starting at 6:30 p.m. In addition, we will be open all the Sundays in the month of December from 1-3 p.m. to coincide with the Octagon house openings. The Knight-Sutton Museum admission is always free. Please stop by to see the various exhibits, explore the research room, and share vour Akron- Newstead memories.

My final thought is a loving remembrance of Flora Leamer, who recently passed away. She was always one of our strongest supporters. I recall fondly my first walking tour, where over 100 people turned out and we did not have enough tour books. She and John had put it on their blog to help promote it. We had a table set up at the RTOH to sell the books and ran out. We took names and phone numbers and took a batch of newly printed booklets to the library for pick up the following week. Flora offered her book back that day. I just thought that was sweet. It was not going to solve the problem, but it was sweet. Through the years she (and John) have been at every event, opening, tour, parade, whatever, for every non-profit you can think of. Even when she was ill, she came to our program meeting last month. She will be deeply missed and the community at large owes she and John a huge debt of gratitude for all their efforts on all our behalf all these years. A life well lived.

A Christmas Tradition.....Gone but not forgotten!

In December of 1955, Ford Mason, president of The Kiwanis Club of Akron extended the merriest of "Seasons Greetings" to the community through the purchase of a manger scene purchased by the organization.

It was announced that the scene would be set up in Russel Park for the community to enjoy and it was the hope that it would be well

received and become an annual presentation. A rail fence was secured from the Borchert Farm on Carney Road, slabs of wood for the manger were secured from one of the local sawmills and it was assembled in Lloyd Brunings barn. It was the hope of the Kiwanis Club that Christ would be first in Christmas that year and for many years to come.

The manger scene in Russel Park was once a Christmas tradition that was always a reminder that it was Christmas time in Akron. This tradition lasted for a quarter of a century. I could not find any information as to why this stopped, what happened to it or whose decision it was to stop it. I do, however, remember it being there in the mid 70's and I remember there would be caroling around it by various churches and residents. I remember walking to the park with my children to look at it on a snowy evening to talk about the real reason for Christmas.

It was a beautiful sight to behold, a lovely Christmas tradition for the village and although it is gone, I can assure you it is not forgotten.

RECIPE CORNER

From *English Housewifry* by Elizabeth Moxon dated 1764. The recipe is titled "**To make Chocolate Cream**". This recipe is much better than modern chocolate pudding.

To make Chocolate Cream

Take four ounces of chocolate, more or less, according as you would have your dish in bigness, grate it and boil it in a pint of cream, then mill it very well with a chocolate stick; take yolks of two eggs and beat them very well, leaving out the strain, put to them three or four spoonfuls of cream, mix them together, set it on the fire, and keep stirring it till it thicken, but do not let it boil; you must sweeten it to your taste, and keep stirring it till it be cold, so put it into your glasses or china dishes, which you please. I use the following modern interpretation:

Chocolate Cream

1 pint cream 3.2 oz. dark unsweetened 92% cacao chocolate* (* I used Aldi Moser Roth Dark 85% Cocoa – 4 bars of the 5 bar pkg.) 3/4 cup sugar 2 egg yolks, beaten



Mix the cream, chocolate, and sugar in a double boiler to melt the chocolate and dissolve the sugar. Temper the egg yolks by spooning a bit of the cream mixture into them and mixing (to prevent the eggs from cooking prematurely). When the eggs are warm, add to the cream mixture. Transfer to a pot and bring to a boil. The chocolate cream sets as it cools. For best results, refrigerate for a few hours.
